SPEED LIMIT & SAFETY in the NEIGHBORHOOD

When Mariana Cove was designed and built, starting in the late 1990s, the City of Loveland in its wisdom allowed it to have no sidewalks, which makes it unique within the city limits. We have been grateful that no one has yet been injured in our neighborhood because of speeding vehicles. We do know that there have been several near calls. We have walkers, dog walkers, strollers, wheelchairs, joggers, bike riders, and kids playing in the streets. And it isn't just our neighborhood, since residents of the Springs to our west and the Overlook to our north also use our neighborhood (as we do theirs) to get in a good daily walk.

Since the residents of Deer Meadow Court closed access to their short private road (across the ditch from the Overlook bridge), our triple neighborhood has no safe access to leave the immediate area. Some of the more adventurous walkers will walk the ditch and then clamber down the ditch bank near Deer Meadow bridge to gain access to Deer Meadow Drive and Rossum drive. Return, is either back up the bank or via First Street from Rossum Drive and a walk along the road. The wide berm is OK if it isn't wet, but essentially, walkers are forced on to the narrow bike lane at several points along the one-third of a mile that has no side walk. There is about 100 yards of sidewalk from Rossum Drive along the north side of First Street and a sidewalk bordering the Overlook neighborhood up to the ditch. In between is the hazardous one-third mile with traffic nearly always exceeding the 45 mph speed limit by 5-20 mph.

For nearly 6 years the HOA has been petitioning the city to help with traffic control, but to no avail. On August 15, several Mariana Cove residents attended and spoke to the City Council directly. The response from our councilors' was one of surprise at the lack of action by the city traffic manger. Board member Kim Schatz has been leading the charge to get some form of 'traffic-calming' implemented by the city. The mangers response was odd. He insisted that everything was OK, despite our pleas otherwise.



His response was to visit the neighborhood and remove the "Slow Down – Watch for Children" signs we had put up 15 months earlier as part of the boards efforts to slow traffic. He also removed the traffic cones with the attached speed limit sign. Apparently we cannot place anything on city property, which includes the islands, road berms and road, without city permission.



About five weeks ago the city installed the electronic speed monitor at the junction of Ferryboat Court, visible as you drive down Cove Drive. It seems to have made a difference at the top of the neighborhood, but traffic speeds up as it reaches the bottom of the hill. It is temporary for just six months. The residents asked the city council to consider two speed monitoring signs to be permanently installed, and speed bumps were also mentioned as solutions to the speed problem. Kim has also been requesting that the speed limit be reduced to 20mph for further safety.

The current speed limit within MC is 25 mph, meaning an alert person would still take 57 feet to stop (the distance of nine people laid end-end). Most people are aware of traffic, but how alert are all the drivers? It's too easy to get distracted when speeding deliberately or inadvertently. Its only a matter of time before a


COMMUNITY SOCIAL EVENTS
